Summer Internships/ Advanced Camp/CTLT

This summer, cadets across all Military Science (MS) levels kept themselves busy. Twelve cadets participated in internships across the Army, working with the Army Medical Department. The United States Northern Command (NORTHCOM), The United States Africa Command (AFRICOM), Army Cyber Institute, NASA, MIT's Lincoln Laboratory, the Nuclear Science and Engineering Research Center, and the FBI.

CDTs (cadets) Ethan Barhydt('24), Peter Vigano('25), Matthew Stewart('25), and Thomas Ellis('23) all earned their Air Assault wings this summer raising the battalion total to 11 Air Assault qualified cadets. 10 cadets participated in Project GO (a Department of Defense internship program created to improve the various skills needed to excel as future military officers), traveling domestically to Georgia, Maryland, and North Carolina, as well as abroad to Taiwan, Jordan, and Brazil.

The MSIV class crushed Cadet Summer Training, earning a 85.72% O+E (outstanding + excellent) rating which places the class' performance #1 in the brigade and in the top 1% in the nation.

37.71% of the MSIVs earned RECONDO honors (first time go at each event), which is more than 25% higher than the Cadet Command average. Additionally, four MSIVs chose to participate in Cadet Troop Leader Training, shadowing lieutenants at Fort Bragg, Schofield Barracks, Hunter Army Airfield, and Joint Base Lewis-McChord, gaining valuable insight into life as a platoon leader.

A Visit with General Dempsy



Army Ten Miler

Over Columbus Day

Battalion sent fourteen Cadets to compete in the annual
Army Ten Miler in Washington,
D.C. After completing several
months of training, they represented the Battalion admirably.
3 cadets placed in the top 3%
out of 12,000 participant, clocking times of just over 1 hour for the 10 mile race.

Additionally, the A-Team brought home a 4th place finish out of 55 teams in the ROTC-Service Academy Division, right behind West Point teams and a Virginia Tech team. All Cadets had an incredible time in D.C., with some highlights including a picture with MG Munera, commander of The U.S. Army Cadet Command (USACC), a moment with the Sergeant Major of the Army Micheal A. Grinston, and getting to witness UH-60 Blackhawk flyovers and demonstration jumps by the United States Army Parachute Team (Golden Knights). The team cannot wait to race again through the streets of our nation's capital again next year!


